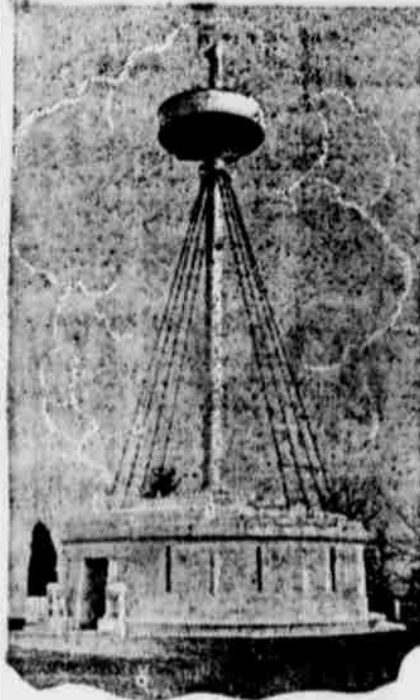

TIMES DYNAMITER TAKEN

M. A. Schmidt Arrested in New York After a Search of Four Years.

New York.—M. A. Schmidt, object of a world-wide search for more than four years, in connection with the dynamiting of the Los Angeles Times, was arrested here. Detective William J. Burns, who, with Detective Captain William S. Devy, of the New York police department, made the arrest, asserted that Schmidt admitted his identity a few minutes after he was taken into custody.

Schmidt was taken on a fugitive warrant. According to Burns, he is charged with being one of the three men who bought 1600 pounds of dynamite with which the newspaper plant was ruined and 21 persons carried to their deaths.

The house has appropriated \$366,000 for the Umatilla reclamation project, and \$377,000 for the Klamath project. Twenty-five thousand dollars has been appropriated for fire protection of lands involved in the Oregon & California land grant suit.
