Notes from Little Willow, Idaho.  
 We have room for more home builders here and the price of land is right. No one can say that this valley has ever been over estimated or the land held up beyond its face value and we do not raise prunes or apples. The bench does that.

 There is an unusual acreage of alfalfa well as rye and other grains, in the valley and on the hills, which are especially adapted to dry farming. Under the present shortage of grain every available acre of ground should be put in grain. "As ye sow, so shall ye reap."  
 L. H. Patton recently shipped two cases of hogs and a case of young beef to the Portland market.  
 R. Y. Curtis, father of Mrs. L. A. Walker, is in Ontario this week visiting his daughter and old time friends.  
 Quite an amount of alfalfa seed is being sold from the valley. The price so far has been 10 cents per pound. Most of this seed has been shipped to Baker City and other western points.  
 The hay raised in this valley was sold out last fall to sheep men, except what was fed on the ranches. Most of the farmers are preparing to feed their hay, and dairying will be the chief industry. The amount of dairy product sold from this little valley last year totaled more than \$4,000 and only from seven ranches. We predict more than double that amount for this coming year. The advantage here is unusually good for the hills furnish fine feed for the cows for more than three months in the spring and summer, and the cow does much better that can run out at least part of the season. L. H. Patton is milking 20 cows at the present time and ships 30 gallons of cream to Seattle each week and others are following up. We have not mentioned the hogs that are raised from the skim milk, as also are the calves and many are bought in Payette and raised on the milk until old enough to be turned in the hills. So you can see our industries are many, as we come in strong on turkeys and chickens and eggs. This valley just simply caters to what is actually consumed every day by all the people.
