A hearing on the telephone rate! against the Malheur Home Telephone Ontario. Company, a corporation, defendant.

was forwarded to Boise. R. W. Gard- from Vale and Ontario. ner, local manager, stated that'the petition would have to be taken up with their attorneys in Denver, and it was not probable that this could be done in time to have the hearing Saturday.

In the petition filed, the contract or conveyance between the Ontario Independent Telephone Company and the Malheur Home Telephone Company is set out, in which it is alleged the value of the telephone plant at the time of the sale was in excess of \$30,000, but the plant was sold to the present company at a price of \$15,000, the remainder of the price being the consideration of free tolls perpetually with Nyssa and Fruitland.

It is alleged the contract is broken by the proposal of the present company to charge for these tolls, and also for the company to raise the rental price of rural telephones. Part of section 5 of the complaint reads as follows:

"All in violation of said contract and in violation of Sections 41, 25, 29 and 77 of Chapter 279 of the General Laws of Oregon for 1911, and threatens to and will, unless restrained by an order of this commission, put these charges into effect; that such raise in such rates is unreasonable and in violation of such contract and is in excess of such rates in force January 1, 1911, and in excess of such rates and the rates in force at the time said plant was taken over by the said Malheur Home Telephone Company from said Ontario Independent Telephone Company, and that no notice to these We never full to hear about hard complainants or anyone else has been given of such change or any hearing had before this Commission thereon and that no rates whatsoever provided for or required in Section 26 of Chapter 279 of the Laws of Oregon for Commission showing any interestate rates between Fruitland and Ontario."
