HOUSES FOR POULTRY.

In order to get plenty of sunlight choose a southern or southeastern ex-

ter against cold winds. Select the southern side of a hill, an orchard or buildings. The house must be dry. A site that

provides natural drainage is desirable. Locate the house in as convenient a place as possible.

Fresh air houses should always be used. Cold air, if dry and without drafts, is conducive to ben bealth.

Floors may be earthen, board or cement. Earthen floors may be damp and are bard to clean. Board floors are best for portable houses. Cement floors are best for permanent houses and may easily be kept sanitary.

Walls should be cheap and durable, providing warmth. They should be about five feet high in the rear and from six to eight feet high at the The state of the s The best types of roofs are the A roof, shed or gable roof.

Prepared roofing material is better than shingles or tar paper. All fixtures should be portable to permit of easy cleaning. - Farm Progress.
