Time For Planting Soy Beans, Cowpeas and Sweet Clover In North.

Soy beans and cowpeas should not be planted until the 1st of June in the northern states, and the growth of the plants is not rapid during that month...

A good crop of soy beans in the north may contain 125 pounds of nitrogen, and larger amounts have been obtained in some cases.
