ALASKA REJECTS STATEHOOD

House Passes Memorial Asking Territorial Form of Government.

Juneau, Alaska.-Despite the fervid appeal of delegate James Wickersham that statehood be fixed as the goal of Alaska, the house passed the Millar memorial for a full territorial form government. It is believed that the Millard memorial will be successful, also, in the senate. The Hubbard resolution for statehood was lost in the senate by a tie vote.
