Move on Foot to Promote a Dairy Industry Among Farmers of this Section

OVER TWO HUNDRED ORDERED

The scheme is to buy calves about ten days old, when they can be purchased for an average price of \$8.00. The move is co-operative among the farmers, and the expenses of bringing the calves will be prorated.

CLEAR UP FAIR INDEBTEDNESS

Annual Meeting of County Fair Association will be Held Soon.

Eldon P. King Gets an Appointment to West Point

Son of Will R. King and Former Ontario Boy will Enter Military Training School in June.

Eldon P. King, who will enter West-point June 15, is the son of Hon. and Mrs. Will R. King, and ten years of his early boyhood was spent in Ontario, where he attended school. He moved with his parents from here to Salem when his father became a member of the Oregon supreme court, and attended school there and in Portland, graduating from Hill's Military Academy in Portland in June 1913. Soon after he removed with his parents to Washington, D. C., when his father, Judge Will R. King, was appointed chief counsel of the U. S. reclamation service, which official position he now holds. Eldon P. King received his appointment from Congressman N. J. Sinnott, of this district, to a cadetship in the U. S. Military Academy at West Point, N. Y., and having successfully met all requirements will be admitted to that institution on June 15, of this year.

At the time of receiving notice of the appointment he was attending the Washington and Lee University at Lexington, Virginia. He is a member of the National Academic Fraternity of the Phi Lambda Epsilon and the National College Fraternity of the Phi Gamma Delta.

His many friends in Ontario and Malheur county are well pleased with the appointment and predict for him a successful career through West Point, where he goes to take the four year course, and also after he leaves that institution.
