That whenever an automobile or motorcycle is standing, the engine be shut off and not allowed to run and disturb the peace of the public.  
That when automobiles are stopped at the intersection of streets this stop only be long enough to unload passengers.  
That the State Law governing, be enforced, as to automobiles and motor cycles, regarding lights, speed, license tags and other matters that are constantly being disobeyed to the displeasure of the public.  
Which resolution was duly had at a regular adjourned meeting of the Council held May 19th, 1915, requiring all police officers to be governed accordingly.
