**PEACE LEAGUE ORGANIZED**

Taft Made President and a Propaganda Will Be Started.

Philadelphia.—Within historic Independence Hall on the anniversary of the battle of Bunker Hill, there was formed an organization whose object it will be to promote the creation of a league of nations with a view to preventing wars, or, at least, to lessen the possibilities of armed conflicts. The name adopted by the organization after some debate, was "League to Enforce Peace, American Branch."

Ex-President Taft, who presided over the conference part of the time, was elected permanent president, and, in addition, a long list of representative American citizens was named as permanent vice-presidents. A permanent executive committee was selected, with instructions to take all measures necessary to promote the objects of the league.
