Danville, Ind.—Another case of mysterious disappearance has just been solved by the finding of Elias McDaniel, heir to an estate here, who dropped out of existence more than twenty-five years ago.

San Francisco.—A woman's gold cigarette case and other jewelry were reported to the local police as stolen from the Finland stateroom of Mrs. Chauncey Kapkett when the big liner docked here.

THE UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE estimates that the farmers of the United States are losing annually \$250,000,000 on account of the inaccessibility of their products at certain times of the year, due to bad road conditions.

INVESTIGATION shows that there are many counties rich in agricultural products, but burdened with bad roads, where the annual incoming shipments greatly exceed the outgoing. With improved roads, such counties could not only be self-supporting, but could ship products to other markets.

IN 1909 the percentage of improved roads in the New England states was 22.2 and the percentage of illiteracy was only 1.7. In South Atlantic states the percentage of improved roads was only 6.7 and illiteracy 12. The excess of illiteracy in rural over urban population, due to a lower percentage of improved roads, showed, for the South Atlantic states, 490 per cent and 140 per cent for the New England states. In both of these comparisons, only native whites of native parentage were considered.

Grass Valley, Cal.—All business was suspended in honor of Grass Valley's first church wedding for Chinese.

Miss Rita Bow, pretty daughter of George Bow, one of Northern California's wealthiest Chinese, and Harry Low, owner of the Chinese Toggery, 229 Market street, San Francisco, were married in the Congregational Church. One hundred Chinese and fully as many Americans were present by special invitation.

WOMAN IS IN HER COFFIN FOR THE SECOND TIME. SHE AWOKE AND READ HER OWN OBITUARY.

Chicago.—Two years ago Mrs. Emma L. Pomeroy was pronounced dead and placed in a coffin, preparatory to holding funeral services.

Now Mrs. Pomeroy is dead for a second time. On account of the fact that she came back to life after her "death" in 1913, physicians at St. Luke's Hospital did not pronounce her dead until they had spent several hours trying to revive her.

Then he explained: "One ticket is for my fare, the other nine I owe the company. My wife was visiting in Youngstown a short time ago with our little girl, who was 5 years old last November. They made four or five round trips. It did not occur to my wife that she should pay for the child's trips, and I wish to pay for them now."

This money went to the stockmen who occupy the range to the south and west of Ontario, but little being paid to farmers on irrigated lands. One feature of the Snake river farm must not be overlooked here. It is the naming of the farm and the placing of a bulletin board at the front gate. The boards are neatly painted and are uniform in size. They serve a useful purpose as purveyors of neighborhood and community news, while notices of meetings and other activities are posted and given wide circulation to any matter which needs community attention or action. The plan is worthy of emulation in other Oregon communities.
