COST FARMERS **BIG SUM ANNUALLY**

Annual Cost of 250 Millions Few Good Highways. is Found Where There are

The United States Department of Agriculture estimates that the farmers of the United States are losing annually \$250,000,000 on account of the inaccessibility of their products at certain times of the year, due to bad road conditions.

Investigation shows that there are many counties rich in agricultural products, but burdened with bad roads, where the annual incoming shipments greatly exceed the outgoing. With improved roads, such counties could not only be self-supporting, but could ship products to

In 1909 the percentage of improvedroads in the New England states was 22.2 and the percentage of illitic states the percentage of improved roads was only 6.7 and illiteracy 12. The excess of illiteracy in rural over urban population, due to a lower percentage of improved roads, showed. for the South Atlantic states, 400 per cent and 140 per cent for the New England states. 
WOMAN IS IN HER **COFFIN FOR THE**

The business is more in the nature of the lines followed by trust companies and mortgage investment concerns. With the uncertainty of success which has been strong and abiding in the river section since irrigation was taken up seriously the outside concerns have not been anxious to get business, many of them refusing to accept mortgages on the best land under cultivation until every apparent danger had been passed.

heartbreaking experiences have fallon to the lot of the women, wives, mothers and daughters, who have lived upon the land and been forced to stand the privations and hardships. The struggle to hold the land has forced the most rigid economy in family life and the isolation has added terror and social hunger to the poverty of hundreds of women who have stood firm and steadfast in their faith in the ultimate success of irrigation along the upper Snake. When prosperity shall come with the close of the European war many of the women will be too much broken and discouraged to enjoy the fruits of their sacrifice and efforts in the early days of land developement and orchard planting.

Speaking of the European war: Ontario stockmen have been benefited considerably by the demand for horses for use in the service. It is estimated that between \$75,000 and \$100,000 has been paid out through local banks on account of purchases made by the French and British war departments during the eight months last past. This money went to the stockmen who occupy the range to the south and west of Ontario, but little being paid to farmers on irrigated lands. On the other hand orchardists are feeling the depressing effects of the war on the market conditions which govern the sale of their apples and prunes.

Last year fire blight appeared in several orchards along the Snake. the disease affecting Rome Beauty and Jonathan almost exclusively. This year the blight spread over the valley and sent terror to the hearts of men whose orchards were in bearing. Indications are that before the blight can be stamped out all the Rome Beauty and Jonathan trees will have been destroyed, and only those varieties which are immune from its ravages will be cared for by local orchardists. At any rate the loss is sure to be heavy and it comes and cows thesettlers would not have at a time when producers have plenty of burdens to bear.

One feature of the Snake river farm must not be overlooked here. It is the naming of the farm and the name of the farm, the name of the owner, and information as to what products are for sale and what products or animals or articles are wanted. The boards are neatly painted and are uniform in size, They serve a useful purpose as purveyors of neighborhood and community news, while notices of meetings and other activities are posted and given wide circulation to any matter which needs community attention or action. The plan is worthy of emulation in other Oregon commun-
