Sells Blooded Stock to Company at Caldwell

New Plymouth.—The sale of 150 head of blooded red shorthorn cattle last week marks the largest sale of blooded stock ever known in this vicinity. The sale included the entire herd belonging to the Scientific Poultry & Livestock Co., to the Caldwell Cattle Co., of Caldwell, Ida. J. C. Erhlick and Mr. Fisher, the owners of the Scientific Poultry & Livestock farm who have been operating a thoroughly up-to-date and sanitary dairy three miles east of town, but recently they dissolved partnership, hence the sale of the cattle.

Erhlick farm for the present and will be sold to farmers in this section on the installment plan. A large number of them are being milked on the ranch. No doubt the cattle will be greatly in demand as a number of the farmers have, in the past year, gone in for dairying and the greater number of them claim it is profitable to purchase thoroughbred stock.

FUNERAL SERVICES HELD AT WEISER

Weiser.—Funeral services for Major Harvey S. Buck, member of the G. A. R. and former postmaster at Sumpter were held here Friday afternoon. The deceased was 78 years old, but in good health until he was injured by being run into by a cyclist on Main street in Baker a few days ago. He was removed to St. Elizabeth's hospital where he died Thursday morning.

Major Buck was born in 1837 in Gouverneur, New York, and served in the northern army during the civil war. In 1900 he came to Oregon from St. Joseph, Mo., where he had made his home after the war.

He is survived by two sisters, Mrs. Lucy M. Smith and Mrs. Martha J. Heck and one brother G. W. Buck, all residing in Weiser, and one daughter, Miss Pearl Buck, who makes her home in Baker.

WELCOMED TEACHERS WITH BIG RECEPTION

Nyssa.—A reception was held at Parish hall Friday evening, welcoming the new teachers in the public school. It was a very successful event being well attended and all the newcomers were made to feel that the whole community was in sympathy with their work and ready to aid them in every way possible.

Rev. C. A. Quinn was the instigator of the reception and acted as master of ceremonies, and explained briefly the object of the meeting. Mayor Francis made an address of welcome in behalf of the city of Nyssa and J. M. Duncan spoke in behalf of the school board. A number of musical numbers were rendered by local talent.

Prof. P. P. Brainard the new principal of the school made a very pleasing talk and spoke very highly of the pupils of the Nyssa School. The reception committee was composed of Mrs. J. Boydell, Mrs. Frank D. Hall and Mrs. C. H. Davison. It is planned to make the reception to the teachers an annual event in the future.

BAKER COUNTY FAIR CLOSED LAST WEEK

Baker.—With more and better exhibits, with larger crowds, better races and more enthusiasm on the part of the crowd in general the Baker County fair closed last week was a decided success. It was thought early in the season that the County Fair would be abandoned this year, but later proceeds were raised by popular subscription and it was given as the "People's Fair of Baker County."

The opening day was Baker Day and Haines Day and it was estimated that over 4,000 people were on the grounds. Thursday the Boosters for the Round-Up arrived from Pendleton and kept things lively during their visit.

One of the features every afternoon was the thrilling and sensational parachute drop by Lucile Belmont. The races in general were unusually good and many favorite horses were on hand, that have won the Baker people before. The livestock parade was the best ever seen on the grounds and many cheers went up from the grandstand as herds of fine registered stock came past. The "Worst Turnout" contest was a new feature and caused a great deal of interest and laughter. The winning couple was a prominent doctor and his wife driving an old hack borrowed from a Chinese gardner.

Proposes Change in Burns Mail Service

Burns.—A proposed change in the mail service for Burns which will affect the mail from the east, is under consideration and the department has advertised for bids, the notices being posted in the local post office last week. So far local residents have not been able to see any particular benefit from the proposed change.

One proposition asks for bids on Riverside by way of Harriman and the mail three times a week from Lawsons to this city. Another call for bids for a three times a week service from Burns to Buchannon by way of Harney, and another from Burns to Harney, the latter contract not to be let if satisfactory bids

are secured for the Burns-Buchannon route. The distance is practically the same from Riverside as from Juntura, from where the mail is now brought and any particular benefit in the change is not visible. This section has been particularly handicapped in the mail service for the past few years. If the proposed route is taken up it will cut off our direct communication with Drewsey, compelling the mail to be sent by way of Riverside. With the railroad now building west from Riverside, we feel that it will only be a few months until a new contract would be let so the citizens would prefer that for the present the contract remain as it is.

FILES SUIT AGAINST FIRST NATIONAL BANK

Baker.—The Columbia Mining Company has filed suit against the First National bank of this city to recover \$14,756.83 alleging that Frank S. Baillie, manager of the mining company, embezzled that amount from the company on August 1st, and deposited the amount in the bank.

Mr. Baillie claims that the money placed on deposit at the bank was due him and that the amount was determined after a careful invoice of the company's books. He states that both he and the bank acted in good faith.

Getman of the church officiated, and interment was in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.
