# CONSTRUCTION IS BEING RUSHED ON NEW RAILROAD

All of the sub-contracts for the entire thirty-five miles of railroad to be built out from Riverside in the next few months have been let and the scene of operation is certainly a busy one. All of the work has been sub-contracted with the exception of the concrete work, the construction of which the Twoby Bros., will do themselves.

Nine construction camps employing over three hundred men and working one hundred and fifty head of horses are stationed along the right of way. Contracts read that the dirt work must be completed December 1st, leaving the solid rock work for winter. The road is to be completed June 1st, 1916.

The company maintain headquarters at Riverside, Mr. Cunningham being in charge of the office. Mr. H. W. Young of the O. W. R. & N. force of engineers also has headquarters at Riverside. Mr. Young had charge of the engineering work for the company when the road from Juntura to Riverside and completed his work sixty days ahead of schedule time.

He is endeavoring to complete his part of the road into the Harney valley also ahead of time allowed by the company.
