Mr. Sinnott, representative in this district, has just completed a tour of seventeen counties investigating the legislative needs of the various communities. His trip has been made for the most part by automobile and plenty of time has been taken for the Congressman to familiarize himself with the conditions existing in his district, and to hear the views of many individuals, and hear the wishes of the people.

Friday of last week Mr. Sinnott returned to Juntura with Attorney J. Gallagher, of that place, on a visit to the Warm Springs project. Mr. Sinnott reports that he was favorably impressed with the progress of the Warm Springs project, under the present policy of the Secretary of the Interior, the one to carry on this project is not feasible.

Mr. Sinnott states that Secretary of the Interior Lane is unfavorable to the present time to the appropriation of money for the commencement of projects, so long as there are unfinished projects, which need appropriations for their completion, regardless of where they may be located.

The fact that such a policy is entirely unfair to Oregon, has been pointed out to the Secretary, but failed to break his policy.
