EXHIBITS ARE MUCH BETTER THAN USUAL

That the agricultural and horticultural exhibits at the fair this year were much better than in former years, is attested by H. H. Weatherspoon who has acted as one of the judges for the past three years. In an interview with the Argus, Mr. Weatherspoon says:
 "The 1915 fair has proven to be the greatest in the history of the county as can well be testified to by any and all who have been connected with the work. The educational features of a county fair must begin to bear 'good fruits' as is evidenced by the classy selection of all farm products this year, as compared with other years. In this respect the exhibits as a whole run at least 50 per cent higher in class, than in former years, which goes to show that farmers and fruit growers have learned how to select good stuff, and know it when they see it.
 "In every line of agriculture, except potatoes and corn, the exhibits were far above the general average of former years and the fall down in potatoes is due to the diseased condition of the entire potato family in Malheur county, rather than to carelessness. The slight fall down in corn is due evidently to carelessness in selection, rather than any other cause, since there is a larger acreage to select from than ever before, and the quality is good. A little more care in selection should have been practiced.
 "From a horticultural point I do not believe a better exhibit has ever been placed on exhibition at a county fair in the state. Competition in nearly all varieties of apples were very close. In fact, at times so close

that it was a hard matter to decide who deserved the blue ribbon.
 "As a whole, if the entire building full of exhibits could have been picked up and let down in some of the eastern states just as it was here, Malheur county would have to import more real estate men in order to take care of the incoming homeseekers who would follow.
 "It may be said that this county has the 'nerviest' bunch of boosters to be found in Oregon. In view of the fact that former years has seen bad weather, and lack of attendance accordingly, it seems that every one now comes up with a smile, and this year has pulled off the biggest stunt ever.
 "The arrangement and decorations in the agricultural buildings deserve great credit, due, I think, to a keen foresight of Supt. Bailey and his associates, who appear not to have left a single detail undone.
 "From a county fair standpoint, as I see it, and I see all Eastern Oregon fairs, Malheur county pulls off the best of all"
