HOW TO DEAL WITH JACK RABBITS

Some persons have called for a bounty on jack rabbits. Some have begged the County Court for poison. Others have been killing rabbits. It is dead rabbits that we want, for dead rabbits are good rabbits, and we do not care how we get him dead. The live rabbit is a menace to everyone, for he ruined the dry farmer, thinned the range and is now eating the hay for the stockmen, after each pair had given their numerous families a good start upon the rich green alfalfa fields in the early summer.

Yes, everyone was hit by the jack rabbits and will be hit again unless everyone fights him now while he is within easy reach. Some localities have wiped him out already, and each locality can if they will, and there is no time like the present while the deep snow is on.

There are two methods that have been used with big success in each case. One is the use of poisoned aifaita and the other to use chicken wire fencing to form a trap of the stack yards. Both metoods can be practiced to good advantage, and the latter especitlly. My observations during the last three weeks have convinced me that these two methods if practiced will keep the rabbits in control.
