We should flood our own hearts with the God given attributes of patriotism, fidelity and loyalty; of justice, integrity and humanity. We should steel ourselves to meet the shock, if it comes, with a calm and inflexible purpose to do or die in defense of right and our country. . To do otherwise would be to confess ourselves unworthy of the name of American.

SULPHUR FOR ALFALFA

Experiments conducted at this station have led to the discovery that sulphur is a very valuable fertilizer for alfalfa, says F. C. Reimer, superintendent of the Southern Oregon Experiment Station. The experiments indicate that it is probably the sulfur in the superphosphate which is responsible for the large increase in yield where this material is used If future results prove this conclusively, then it will be possible to reduce the cost of our alfalfa fertilizer bill just 75 per cent; for sulphus in the form of crude ground sulphur may be purchased for one fourth what it would cost in the form of superphosphate. This explains satisfactor ily for the first time the valuable results which have been obtained from the use of gypsum and iron sulphate as fertilizers on alfalfa and clovers. These materials are rich in sulfur.
