The meeting was featured by talks from various members and great applause at the nomination of Woodrow Wilson.

The Socialists were stronger than was expected having fifteen members in all. Robert Bender was elected chairman and a platform was suggested upon which to fight for the election. Another meeting was held Monday and the platform adopted. Debbs was suggested as a candidate for President, and various phases of the socialistic ideals were discussed. Robert Bender expects to show some of the ideals of the socialists in his speech in the assembly next Friday and anyone who wishes to hear the three sides of the political question is invited to attend the meeting at the high school next Friday.
