BRIEF WAR NEWS

In Arabia the British report a defeat for a Turkish force which attacked an outpost near Aden.
 The German admiralty officially denies that a German submarine was responsible for the sinking of the Dutch passenger steamer, Tubantia.
 Three officers and 44 men of the crew of the French torpedo-boat destroyer Renardin were lost when a Teutonic submarine sent the vessel to the bottom of the Adriatic.
 The Austrians have turned on the Italians along the Isonzo, where the initiative has recently been for the most part with General Cadonaro's force. Vienna announces a successful attack north of the Tolmino bridge head, in which Italian positions were captured, together with nearly 500 prisoners and three machine guns.
 With the slackening of the fighting around Verdun, the Russians have started a big offensive movement against the Germans on the eastern front.
 Berlin chronicles an attack of great violence by the Russians around Driswiate lake and lake Narocz, but says the Russians were repulsed with great losses, 9270 Russian dead having been counted in the Lake Narocz region.
 Berlin reports the recapture of some ground from the British northeast of Vermelles, in the region of La Bassée, and the driving of the French from a position northeast of Badonvillers, in the Vosges. London admits the capture by the Germans of three mine craters at the Hohenzollern redoubt.
 Five French aircraft dropped bombs on Metz, ammunition depots near Chateau Salins and the aerodrome at Dieuze, while 23 other machines attacked the aviation camp at Habsheim and the freight station at Mulhausen. In battles in the air which followed, the Germans and the French each lost three or four machines.
