The Tax-Eating Profession.
For the ten years ending 1915, Oregon taxpayers demanded and collected from the people \$142,000,000.

Considering the average for the ten years, this is over one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the state. Oregon taxes for 1915 for all purposes, state and local were in the aggregate the sum of \$23,983,000. The per capita taxes went up from \$11.42 in 1902 to \$30.50 per capita for the year ending 1915.

While the population increased from 29,000 to 30,000 annually or about 7 1/2 per cent, taxes increased annually 37 per cent.

According to the United States census Montana held the per capita tax record up to 1912, \$26.80 for man, woman and child.

The total bonded indebtedness of Oregon has gone up from \$7.90 per capita in 1890 to \$71.00 per capita in 1912. (U. S. census.)

The total bonded debt at the close of 1915 was \$53,595,825 with an annual interest charge of \$2,786,853. The above are some of the statements of facts and statistics brought out at the state taxpayers convention held at Portland.

Mrs. Esther M. Lockhart, pioneer of Coos county, the first woman to come to the county, and teacher of the first school at Marshfield, is dead. She was 91 years old, and crossed the plains in 1851.

An electric road from Pendleton to Walla Walla and from Cold Springs Landing through Pendleton to Bingham Springs is an undertaking projected by an association of eastern Oregon capitalists.

Eugene Zimmerman Dies.
Cincinnati. — Eugene Zimmerman, ex-president of the Cincinnati, Hamilton & Dayton railroad and wealthy financier of this city, died suddenly at a club here from hemorrhage of the lungs. Mr. Zimmerman was the father of the Duchess of Manchester.

Historic Rose Tree.
The most venerable rose tree in existence is said to bloom against the ancient church of Hildesheim, in Germany. Notwithstanding the many parties which at different times have been in the ascendancy, they all seem to have respected and tended the rose tree, which, it is said, was planted by Charlemagne. The trunk is now almost as big as a man's body. There are five principal limbs trained against the church, the tree being protected by iron railings inclosing an area of about twenty-six square feet. The Reuss Henrys.
For 700 years every prince of the house of Reuss has been christened Henry, with a distinguishing numeral, but the task of identifying them is rendered doubly difficult owing to the existence of two branches, each of which has a different system of numeration. The elder line begins the numbering anew after each batch of 100 Henrys, whereas the younger line goes by the centuries, numbering its princes as they are born from I. upward through each complete hundred years. The territories of the two branches comprise little more than 400 square miles, divided into Reuss-Schleiz-Gera and Reuss-Greiz. For centuries the Montenegro of the Germanic countries, both branches joined the German confederation in 1815, but the elder line (Reuss-Greiz) sided with Austria in 1806, and the principality narrowly escaped being incorporated with Prussia.—Westminster Gazette.
