TO SURVEY ROAD TO INTERIOR

In all probability the forest service will be able to make a reconnaissance survey across Whitman National Forest, from Prairie City in Grant county, to Unity in Baker county, according to information received from District Forester Cecil of Portland by State Engineer Lewis.

This is a connecting link in a proposed route branching from the Columbia river highway and running through the John Day country via Fossil, Canyon City, Unity and to the Idaho line at Ontario.

Senator Loring V. Stewart has been the moving spirit in promoting the adoption of this road, and has interested the counties of Gilliam, Grant, Baker and Malheur in a survey by the state engineer definitely locating the route. Grant county has already set aside \$3000 for this purpose and it is expected the other counties benefiting will assist in a substantial manner.
