HOW I BECAME A STAR.

It was by the sheerest sort of an accident that I ever went into motion pictures. But it was only by earnest and conscientious endeavor that I have achieved some success in this fascinating profession. Even when I was in high school, in Chicago, where my folks moved, when I was a little girl from Minneapolis, I did not have the desire that so many girls have, to go on the stage or in motion pictures.

It is true I appeared in several amateur theatricals at school, but no one said anything in particular about my performance. I mention this to emphasize my state of mind at that time. My ambition was to become a fine singer, not professionally, but for my own amusement. I had a fairly good voice, and I always loved music.

After completing my studies in the Hyde Park high school I went to Philadelphia to a finishing school. I had only been there one season, when I returned to my home for my summer vacation. Together with a group of girl companions, I went one day, to the Essanay studio, to see how motion pictures were made. It was just a lark on my part, although I recall now that several of my girl friends were anxious to see their favorites of the screen in the flesh. I had not seen many motion pictures, and I was not particularly interested in them at the time.

We were shown around the studio by the general manager and he arranged several chairs outside a set where a company of players were at work. I was both amused and interested in the players' work, but even then I did not have any desire to see myself on the screen. I was surprised when several of the girls declared they would like to act before the camera.

When we were leaving the studio, one of the directors, to whom we had been introduced, asked me if I would like to appear in pictures. I told him I did not think so. He said he could not understand this, as most of the girls he had met were extremely anxious to get into the work. In fact, he said his greatest problem was getting rid of them without giving offence. He asked me a second time, if I would not reconsider his offer. I told him the idea was preposterous, as I was not interested enough myself, and I knew my folks would not consider it for a moment.

However, he persisted in writing down my address and telephone number, which I reluctantly gave him, on the advice of the other girls, who said it was "a lot of fun." The following day I was astonished, when he called me on the telephone and asked if I could not call at the studio, and at least appear in one picture. Again I told him it was impossible. He called again the following day. My mother was out, but my aunt was there. She was perplexed about the mysterious conversation she overheard, and I told her of the situation.

My girl friends had been calling me too, asking if I had heard from the director, and if I was going in pictures. All of them said he would be "just grand," and they advised me to make one trial. By this time I must confess I was becoming interested. I had been to see several good pictures with my aunt. She was especially fond of them. At length, she told me if I cared to appear in one picture she would try and arrange matters with my parents, and would agree to accompany me to the studio and remain with me while I was at work.

Arrangements were finally consummated, and I called up the director and told him I would be there the next day. He induced me to come over that very afternoon, which I did. We were both surprised when the director told me I was to have the leading role. It was a two reel feature, with a story dealing with the evils of the loan sharks, who were thriving in Chicago at that time. The newspapers were making a campaign against the sharks, and the picture was the outcome of this agitation.

So, I really started in the very first picture in which I appeared. It is needless to say that I was fascinated with the work from the very start. And when I saw the picture run off in the studio for the first time I experienced the greatest thrill of my life. After that I was starry by the Essanay company. Altogether, I have appeared in more than five hundred pictures. If there was no other reason, I would feel amply repaid for my hard work, in the thousands of letters I have received from friends I have made all over the world. It is a joy that cannot be expressed in mere words.

Francis X. Bushman soon became the most popular star on the screen and the Essanay company arranged for us to appear together. It proved

a happy combination, from many standpoints, as both of us feel that we have been of great benefit to each other. We constantly criticize each other. All the time trying to improve our work. Right now we are at work on a production, the dream of my life—a stupendous screen production of "Romeo and Juliet." It is being made by the Metro Pictures corporation, the company that has afforded Mr. Bushman and myself opportunity to develop the big things we had in mind and dreamed of in our early work. Since joining the Metro we have appeared together in "The Wall Between," "Pennington's Choice," "A Million a Minute," and other features.

TEST, DON'T COMPLAIN.
These same men that complain that there is no money in dairying could not make money at any other business if they took no more interest, were as ill informed as to the methods of operation, showed no spirit of cooperation and trusted everything to the other fellow. If you are skeptical as to the value of a cow testing association why just for your own satisfaction weigh and test one day per month the milk from each cow in your herd and post your records in such manner that you can refer to them later, then, if you are honest with yourself, you will admit the value of record work and will either faithfully continue it or will join a cow testing association. Write to the extension service of the O. A. C. and ask for record sheets and a pamphlet on record keeping which will be sent free, also for help in effecting a cow testing association if there are 600 or more cows in twenty-five to thirty herds in an eight or ten mile radius of a given point in your community and bring to your community the services that are being rendered to other communities where cow testing associations are operating.
