WORK FOR THE FAIR.

If there is one institution of which Ontario and Malheur county has just reason to be proud of it is the County Fair and the organization which is in charge. There is no other body of citizens in the county more public spirited. There is no aggregation which has so generously given of its time and talent for the public good than the officers of the Fair association. They deserve success.

If the people of Ontario and the citizens of Malheur county would further their best interests in a practical manner there is nothing they can do which would achieve this end to better purpose than to give to the fair officials that measure of co-operation which their work merits. That is all that is now needed to make the fair the biggest success ever registered in this section.

The men in charge have provided the exhibits. They have advertised the fair widely and thoroughly throughout the county and in the adjacent portions of Idaho. REPUDIATED.

By their votes in the election Monday the electors of Maine repudiated the policies of the present democratic national administration. They defeated Senator Charles F. Johnson, who as a member of the finance committee in the senate helped to frame the present Underwood tariff. Nothing could be more convincing than this for it demonstrates that the people of this country do not desire, as a permanent policy the doctrine of tariff for revenue only as administered by a party which at heart believes in free trade.

Significant as is the above result to republicans it does not give any greater cause for rejoicing than the return of the progressives to the republican party.

For the past few months the question has been, "where will the progressives go?" Judging from the results in Maine that question has been given a decisive answer. They are not "coming back." They are back. Of course there are a few progressives who will not return, for some of them were democrats before 1912, but their number was negligible as was evidenced by the vote in Maine.

The result in Maine also furnishes food for thought on the part of democrats who have been deprecating the character of the campaign being waged by Mr. Hughes. Tho they sent their very best campaigners, including the redoubtable Champ Clark and nearly every member of the cabinet into the Pine Tree state, the democratic party did nothing but hold their party vote.

Since the campaign in the northeast corner of the nation was fought on strictly national lines with national issues pressed to the forefront by both parties there can be no doubt concerning the temper of the people. They have repudiated the democratic administration and have paved the way toward a return of the republican party to power. Long live the republicans of Maine.

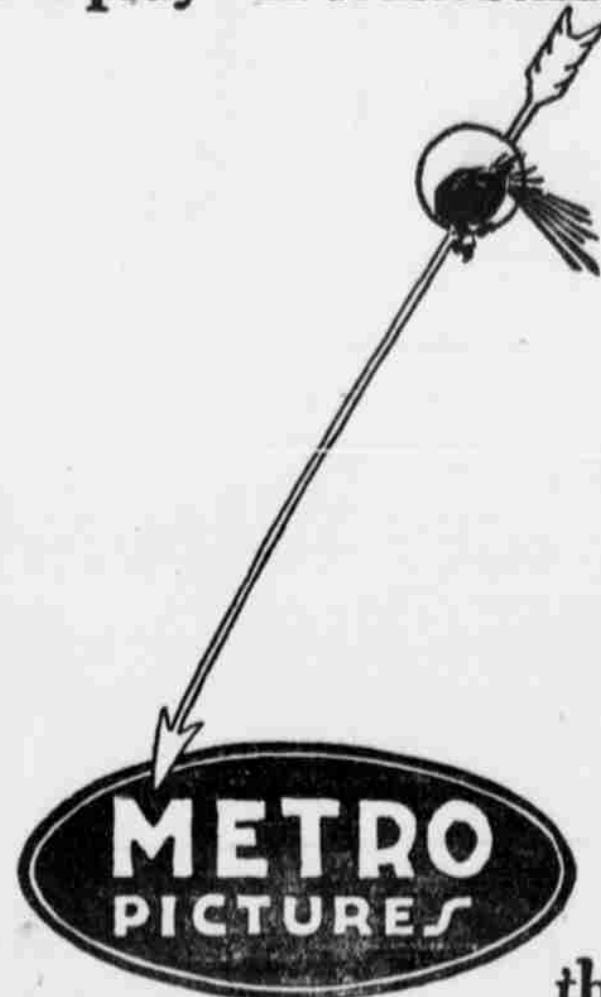
