FAMOUS SOLOISTS TO COME.

Royal Welsh Male Quartette Will Visit This City at an Early Date.

The Royal Welsh Male Quartette, Newport, South Wales, survivors of the Lusitania disaster, will appear at Dreamland on December 18 and will be remembered as the leading soloists of Gwent Singers who appeared in America only two weeks before they sailed on the ill-fated Lusitania. They returned to America shortly and will be heard in concert throughout the United States and Canada. They were fortunate to secure Arthur Smith as pianist for the Gwents on their American tour. Owing to illness last season Mr. Smith was replaced a few weeks of the tour by Spencer Hill, who had appeared with the chorus. Mr. Smith is a graduate of the Royal Academy of London and has played by command twice before the king and queen of England, also appeared at the White House, Washington, with the Gwent Singers May 22nd, 1913. He is a pianist of national reputation and will render two piano selections during the evening.

One of the most interesting descriptions of the Lusitania disaster will be given during the evening by Mr. Risa Williams, the oldest member of the Gwent organization. He will tell of his rescue from a raft after floating five hours, of his meeting the survival of the Gwents the next day in Queenstown, Ireland, and the great loss of their famous director, Geo. F. Davies.

Mr. Williams closes with Longfellow's psalm of life and the quartette renders just one stanza of "Abide With Me" as they sang while on a raft off the coast of Ireland, May 7. The music loving people of Ontario will be glad to welcome these splendid singers back to America, who on last season's tour sang their way into the hearts of the American people.

CROPS THAT ROB THE FARM.

Farmer Must Manage to Restore Fertility That Has Been Exhausted.
 (Prepared by United States department of agriculture.)

It is estimated that every ton of cowpea hay taken from the farm the measure of which is not returned to the soil robs it of \$7.50 worth of fertility if bought in the form of commercial fertilizer; a ton of cotton seed, \$18.80; an acre of corn producing fifty bushels, both stalk and grain, \$18.50; the grain alone, \$9.25; an acre of oats producing thirty-five bushels removes in the entire crop \$11.33 and \$4.72 for the grain alone.

In many cases exhaustion of the soil by cropping has gone on until the farm responds reluctantly to the many drafts made upon it. The farmer must manage to restore this fertility. No better method of doing this can be found than to keep enough stock on the farm to utilize the pasturage of idle lands and much of the surplus grain and forage produced. The stock should be kept under sheds and in stables when possible and an abundance of bedding furnished to absorb the liquids as well as to add to the bulk of the manure heap.

The roots and stubble of crops always restore something to the soil. With such crops as clover, cowpeas or beans approximately 30 per cent of the manurial value of the crop is kept in the soil. When such crops are harvested for hay and fed to good farm stock and the manure is returned to the land 80 to 90 per cent of the entire fertilizing value is kept on the farm. At the same time the full feeding value is obtained.

Farm manure should be handled with great care. It should never be left in the open yard or piled in the field for any length of time, as much of its plant food will be leached out. Neither should it be stored loose under sheds, but it should be packed down and kept wet enough to prevent heating, which would drive off nitrogen. This tremendous loss from improper handling explains why farmers find it necessary to use such large quantities of manure to derive much benefit from it. It will be observed that even when manure is stored in a shed there is loss. By covering the manure heap with substances like ordinary loam, sawdust or wheat straw much loss may be prevented and the stock of manure greatly increased. Loam will absorb about thirteen pounds of nitrogen per ton of 2000 pounds, sawdust about eight pounds and wheat straw nearly four pounds.

Navasota, Tex., has remedied this in a device to be secured to the farmer's shoe by which the cutting is done with a quick movement of the foot and no leaning over is required.
