FRUITLAND'S GROWTH

Fruitland Holds a Big Community Meeting in Assembly Hall of the New High School.

Fruitland has always turned out well to any doings of interest to the home or school so County Agricultural agent, W. T. McCall and Miss Fay Z. Fowler, county superintendent of schools were not disappointed at the crowd which gathered last Friday evening. L. B. Mackinson, president of the school board, presided. Prof. T. R. Neilson treated the audience to several selections on the school Victrola during the evening.

Mrs. E. W. Madsen represented the Mothers Circle work, speaking of the interest it has in our school and its surroundings as well as in our homes.

Miss Vaye Bowers of the senior class voices the students appreciation of the spacious, pleasant, well lighted new school building.

An interesting sketch of the history of the school district and its struggles from its beginning when with two hundred dollars they built a school house, furnished it and hired a teacher for a four months term at \$25 per month, and had to wait over a year for his last months pay; to the present time when the little house 12x12 has been replaced by our nice new building with its pianos, Victrola, pictures, play ground fixtures, school wagons and the seventeen teachers employed with no salary less than \$65 per month, was given by Miss Elsie Schmid, one of the grade teachers who attended the school almost from its organization.

The plan was thoroughly discussed by Mr. McCall and a committee named to look after the organization of the farmers bureau here in Fruitland.
