VIVID DESCRIPTION OF TRAGIC DISASTER

Will Be Given By a Member of the Welsh Male Quartette.

On May 1st last ten members of the Welsh Male choir sailed from New York on the Lusitania, leaving two behind who sailed a week later on the Transylvania and landed safely. The three lost on the Lusitania were George P. Davies, conductor; Isaac Jones, baritone and David T. Hopkins.

Of the survivors four are to appear in this city. Mr. Williams who gives the half hour narration of the disaster, which time seems but a few minutes, so rapt each auditor, as he tells in fine diction and manly reserve the story that was a great vivid picture of his experience.
