**REAL ESTATE MOVING  
 ON THE DEAD OX FLAT**

A. B. Wines of Payette Visits Ontario And Tells of Transfers Above This City.

The real estate world, at least that portion of it located near Ontario and Payette has not looked so good in the past three years as it does now, says A. B. Wines of Payette who was here on Tuesday.

"Two weeks ago a rancher from Washington state came down to Weller and Payette looking for dry land," said Mr. Wines, "and he was taken over to Dead Ox Flat to look at a number of tracts. He, however, decided that some of the land under the Snow-Moody ditch looked good to him. He made the purchase of 133 acres and the next day leased 166 acres of it at a cash rental of \$20 per acre for next year. And one-half of the lease was paid in cash, the balance to be paid when the land is plowed.

"Last week another larger tract on Dead Ox Flat was sold to another Washington man and there is a demand for other holdings. It looks to me right now as the things are going to start moving around here for the real estate market is better than it has been in three years.
