ONLY FIFTY VOTERS CAST VOTES MONDAY

Few Citizens Even Noticed Day on Which City Administration Was Selected.

Monday was election day. This will be news to many citizens judging from the lack of interest manifested at the polls. There were only 50 votes cast and the election was but a formal ratification of the action of a caucus attended by but 25 citizens two weeks ago.

As the result of the ballot the following were elected for the two year term: Ward Canfield, C. R. Emison, L. O. McCoy. For the one year term W. W. Letson and Ray Wilson. The retiring councilmen are: E. A. Fraser, Frank Everheart and H. L. Peterson.

At the meeting of the council Monday evening shortly after the election the returns were canvassed by that body and certificates of election were issued Tuesday by Recorder C. M. Stearns, to the successful candidates.

WARMSPRINGS SUITS TO FEDERAL COURTS

Pacific Live Stock Company Asks Transfer of Condemnation Suits to Federal Jurisdiction.

Thru its local attorney, J. P. Gallagher, the Pacific Live Stock company owner of the land necessary for the reservoir site of the Warm Springs Irrigation district, has taken the necessary steps to transfer the proceedings to the federal courts.

The suits to condemn the land were started by the board of directors of the Warm Springs Irrigation district in the state courts, but the owner being a non-resident of the state it exercised its privilege of having the action heard in the federal court. Whether or not this will delay the progress of the suits depends entirely on the amount of business before the court.
