MISS CLARK TELLS OF COUNTY SCHOOLS WORK

The school children of the county responded well to the call of Supt. Arne of the Boys and Girls Aid society of Portland for donations of money and supplies. It is impossible, at this time, to make a report of what was done by all of the schools. Supt. Bailey of Ontario reports the splendid contribution of \$29.00 and Supt. Brainard's school at Nyssa has ready for shipment some 200 pounds of potatoes, about two hundred pounds of assorted vegetables, 12 quarts of fruit and some clothing. As the society feels the need of more extra help this year and the railroads ship contributions of food and clothing to them free of charge from November 15 to December thirty-first, any school that did not assist at Thanksgiving time may do so at Christmas. No more worthy object of charity than the aid society exists in Oregon.

Creston is the only school in the county making an allowance in their budget for hot lunches. This is the third year that Creston has furnished hot lunches for their children and they certainly deserve much credit. Other rural districts would do well to adopt the plan. Mrs. Delva St. Clair Wall is teaching in this school.

Reading circle lists are being sent to the teachers this week. Kindly keep these copies because the supply of all circulars is smaller than last year and you cannot be supplied a second time. The price of paper compels us all to be more careful than we formerly were.

Teachers who have no copies of the rules governing the eighth grade examinations will please send for them. As all schools were supplied last year and the rules remain the same, we do not wish to send a copy to a school unless it is needed.

Supt. E. G. Bailey of Ontario has an interesting article on the Ontario high school cadets in the current number of the Oregon Teachers' Monthly. An educational leader in Oregon who is enthusiastic over this work and who was not mentioned in the article is Supt. J. A. Churchill. Last spring he said "That work is

great for high school boys." Enrollment in the three standard high schools of the county has increased very materially this year. Ontario now has 164 pupils, Vale 69, and Nyssa 56. Doubtless much of this increase is due to the fact that the law now requires the county to pay the tuition of boys and girls from the rural and village districts who attend these schools. The tax providing the high school tuition fund is levied on all property outside the districts maintaining the standard four year high schools. Educational leaders all over the United States regard this law as one of the best pieces of school legislation ever enacted. Indications are that many of the other states will enact a similar law.

Alice Curtis has been employed as an assistant to Mrs. Thompson in the Owyhee school. This school is too large for one teacher and the decision of the board to add a teacher is timely. The higher grade of work that can be done now will remove any possible objection to the extra expense incurred.

Clare Morfitt is teaching successfully in District No. 4 west of Vale. Sadie Prewett, one of the Malheur county teachers, is in school in Boise this winter.

Erma Hope and Grace Chappell are teaching in the Rye Valley school.

The Jamieson people are justly proud of one of the most up-to-date two room school buildings in Eastern Oregon. The building is nicely furnished and is fitted with sanitary toilets, drinking fountains and other modern conveniences. The teachers and pupils felt that since the people of the district had given them the beautiful new building they should show their appreciation by adding something useful. By their own efforts they have given the school a new range on which the girls will learn to cook and some manual training equipment with which the boys can work. Under the direction of Mr. Zevely and Miss Baird, teachers, and Mrs. Cox, a good friend of the school, the boys and girls have taken up industrial club work with great enthusiasm. Excellent class room work is being done in the Jamieson school. This is the second year that Mr. Zevely and Miss Baird have had the work in charge.
