#### CHAMPION HIGH JUMPER.

An African Antelope That Can Clear More Than Twenty Feet.

The pallah, a species of African anteope, is probably the greatest living high jumper. Travelers have often asserted that this beast could jump more than twenty feet high. Mr. Cottar, an old African hunter, saw a number of these antelopes leap over the tops of some small trees, and then be measured the trees. They were ofteen feet high.

The animals have the curious habit of jumping over one another's backs, either when frightened or when simply playing. It is an ordinary sight on an African veldt to see a herd of these antelope jumping over one another like boys playing leapfrog. When frightened the first impulse of a herd of pallab is to rush together; then they begin leaping, one after another, going high into the air, clearing small trees, their mates, other antelopes or anything else that gets into the way. They do not require a run before the "take off," but jump as well from a standing position as with a rouning start.

The lion was long supposed to make tremendous bounds when charging his prey, but modern sportsmen say that a lion runs low to the ground, bounding into the air only on his last leap, when he expects to strike. Even such bounds, they say, are of no great length. Stewart Edward White says a tion can run a hundred yards in six seconds, which certainly is fast enough to catch most sorts of game.-Youth's Companion.
