Plymouth, for example, has had no coal for more than three weeks. Payette had none for two weeks but received three cars this week.

An indication of how slowly the coal has moved may be gained from the fact that the Van Petten Lumber company received bills of lading for a car loaded December 2 and the car has not yet reached Ontario. The Ontario Coal company and the Boise Payette Lumber company have experienced similar delays.

In order that the coal so far received could serve as many people as possible not more than half a ton has been delivered to one customer. One coal dealer after having \$5 orders for coal on Monday for one car had \$5 on Tuesday for a second car. The only public institution which has been compelled to close, as yet, is the library which will not re-open until after the present coal shortage has passed.
