

INQUIRY BOARD REPORTS FINDINGS

The following is the findings of board of inquiry convened at Ontario, Oregon, 12:30 P. M., January 9, 1917, for the purpose of investigating and placing responsibility of accident to automobile and injuries to occupants at Mayberg crossing near mile post 6 1/2, Oregon Eastern branch, about 1:55 P. M., January 4, 1917. The board was composed of the following:

Representative of the public: E. A. Fraser, merchant, Ontario, Ore.

Representatives of the railroad: Chas. E. Brooks, Asst. Supt. O. S. L. RR., Nampa, Idaho; L. Rasmussen, Claims Adjuster, O. S. L. RR., Pocatello; H. O. Drane, Agent, O. S. L. RR., Ontario, Ore.

Find that Train No. 373 consisting of engine 1505, combination baggage and passenger car and coach, in charge of Conductor Paul O. Cayou, brakemen A. M. McAfee and John C. Hoagland, Engineer Fred C. Payne and Fireman Lawson Shepard, after making inspection of train and test of air brakes left Ontario on time at 1:30 P. M., January 6, 1917. After proper speed had been attained, running test of the brakes was made and everything found to be working satisfactorily. Train passed Luse Station, Mile Post 5.1 on time at 1:50 P. M. Approaching road crossing known as the Mayberg, Crossing near Mile Post 6 1/2, Oregon Eastern Branch at a speed of 18 or 20 miles per hour, engineer sounded crossing whistle signal of two long and two short blasts, passing the crossing sign which is located about 1350 feet from the crossing. Fireman Shepard, who was putting in a fire, left the deck of the engine and took position on fireman's side to see if crossing was clear. When engine was within 3 or 4 car lengths of crossing, Shepard saw an automobile with all curtains down, approaching crossing from the south about same distance from the crossing as the engine, running at a speed of 15 to 20 miles per hour and called to engineer to stop. Engineer immediately shut off and applied the brakes in emergency but was not able to stop train before colliding with the automobile in which there were six people, two of whom were painfully but not seriously injured and the automobile considerably damaged.

We further find the approaches and crossing in good condition and the crossing warning sign "Railroad Crossing Look Out for the Cars" in proper position; track perfectly straight for a mile and half eastward and nothing to obstruct the view of drivers of vehicles except a dense fog which was hanging over the vicinity of the accident; that engine 1505 is equipped with an automatic bell ringer and that the bell was started ringing leaving Ontario and rang continuously until five or ten minutes after the accident occurred.

After listening to the testimony of all available witnesses, the occupants of the automobile, train crew and persons near the crossing at the time, we conclude that the employees were in their proper places attending to their duties and no blame attaches to them. The weight of the evidence shows that the crossing whistle, two long and two short blasts, were sounded as engine passed the crossing whistle post about one-fourth of a mile from the crossing and engine bell was and had been ringing from the time the train left Ontario until after the crossing was passed.

It appears from the evidence that after the accident all members of the train and engine crew did everything in their power to assist and care for the people in the wrecked automobile and their families.

WHEN PETROLEUM WAS FREE.

That Was Very Early in the History of This Country.

The first reference to the discovery of petroleum in America was contained in a letter written in 1629 by Joseph de la Roche d'Allion, a French missionary working among the Indians. He had crossed the Niagara river and made his way southward through western New York into northern Pennsylvania, where he found a spring from which oil flowed. This oil was highly esteemed by the Indians for medicinal uses.

The letter of the priest was published in 1632 in Sagard's "Histoire du Canada." This oil spring was probably identical with the one described by the Massachusetts Magazine in 1780:

"In the northern part of Pennsylvania there is a creek called Oil creek, which empties into the Allegheny river. It issues from a spring on the top of which floats an oil similar to that called Barbados tar and from which one may gather several gallons a day. The troops sent to guard the western posts baited at the same spring, collected some of the oil and bathed their joints with it. This gave them great relief from the rheumatism with which they were afflicted."—New York World.
