**NEAT SUM FOR LOAN FUND
RESULT OF SILVER TEA**

Literally and figuratively Wednesday was a red letter day in the history of the Ontario Woman's club. The occasion was the annual observation of Red Letter Day which is set apart each year by the Oregon State Federation of Women's clubs for the purpose of raising funds for the Students' Loan Fund. The money thus raised is used to assist young women of the state to secure a college education.

The Ontario Woman's club continued a custom established several years ago of giving a Silver Tea at the home of Mrs. E. M. Greig, president of the club. Despite the fact that the afternoon was marked by chilling weather the number who attended exceeded any similar event in the past and the amount secured also established a record. In all \$18.50 will be Ontario's contribution to the fund this year.

In keeping with the name of the day everything connected with the decorations and refreshments, so far as possible were in red. The parlor and dining room were decorated with boughs and twigs brightened with red and white hand-made flowers, red and white carnations were the center pieces, while under the red shades candles furnished a red glow of light.
