Demands of Promoters meet so far as Local Contributions are Concerned Says Burns Times Herald.

Engineer Faulkner has completed his work on the survey of the railroad line between Burns and the gap and his report in full has been turned over to James Weston and forwarded to Boise for inspection by interested capitalists says the Burns Times-Herald. It is the intention of making another survey in the immediate future to come west from

Crane to Lawen and then north to the present survey. This is done for the purpose of ascertaining the distance and what gain would be made if any in coming that way. It will not delay matters in any manner as this will be done while other matters are being considered.

Preparation for securing right-of-way is being made but no actual field work has been done as yet. This will depend largely upon the route finally decided upon and the attitude of the people served as to the disposition toward the project.

The committee in charge of securing the necessary financial aid in Burns are at work and have accomplished much as almost the entire amount has been pledged. People living along the route and property owners in this vicinity are coming forward with their contributions toward the enterprise and it is pro-

gressing as rapidly as could be expected.
