VALE LOSES TRAIN FIGHT

BEFORE THE PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION OF OREGON

Leonard Cole, Mayor of the City of Vale, Oregon, Plaintiff,

Oregon Short Line Railroad Company, a corporation, Defendant.

ORDER

Complaint by the City of Vale, Malheur County, Oregon, through its Mayor, alleging the train service afforded by the Oregon Short Line Railroad Company is inadequate, unreasonable and unjustly discriminatory.

Pursuant to notice, a public hearing was held in Vale on February 27, 1917, at which time and place testimony was offered and proofs received. The matter has been fully submitted and now stands ready for decision.

On December 24, 1916, the Oregon Short Line Railroad Company, a common carrier subject to the provisions of Chapter 53 of the General Laws of Oregon for the year 1907, inaugurated a new train service schedule between Ontario and the plaintiff city, Vale, and points beyond which resulted in a diminution of the service between Ontario and Vale, and intermediate points. Prior to the effective date of such schedule the defendant company had operated two mixed and one passenger train daily except Sunday, in each direction between those points. The new schedule resulted in the withdrawal of the straight passenger service, and a rearrangement of the mixed train service, and gave rise to much dissatisfaction in Vale, which culminated in a formal complaint to the Commission alleging the present service to be unreasonable, inadequate and unjustly discriminatory.

Vale, the county seat of Malheur County, is located upon a branch line extending from Ontario to Crane, a point about 111 miles beyond Vale, approximately 15 miles from the intersection of this branch with the main line at Ontario. In addition the defendant company operates a branch from Vale to Brogan, a distance of 23 miles, and from Nyssa to Homedale, approximately 25 miles. These branches are so located as to fall naturally into a single operating unit and are so handled by the railroad company. It follows that any rearrangement of train schedules affects each of these branches, and the interests of each community must be given due consideration.

Representatives from practically every community affected were present at the hearing and gave testimony and presented petitions which indicate that the present service, i. e., that of which the plaintiff complains, is satisfactory to their particular communities, and ask that it be not disturbed.

The needs of these communities, which represent by far the greater percentage of the territory and population served, must be respected

and thus the question of a reschedul-

ing of trains is eliminated. This narrows the issue to the single question of whether or not additional train service between Ontario and Vale is justified.

By reason of its location, Vale now has two trains each way daily except Sunday, which also serve the various other localities affected. In addition it has passenger train each way on Sunday furnishing service to and from Ontario. We believe this service is ample for the business offered.

While it may be true the time of arrival and departure of these trains results in some inconvenience, and possible hardship, to the residents of Vale, it is not such, in the opinion of the Commission, as to constitute a public necessity which would warrant the installation and maintenance of additional train service.

As before pointed out, the Commission does not feel justified in changing the present schedules to alleviate this condition on account of the inconvenience and hardship which would result at the other points interested.

It is, therefore, ordered that the complaint in the above entitled matter be and the same hereby is dismissed without prejudice.
