THE LIBERTY LOAN.

Ontario made good on the Liberty Loan. The city is to be congratulated particularly upon the fact that to make up its subscription a large percentage of the citizens united.

While it is true, no doubt, that a very few citizens might have taken the portion of the loan set aside for Ontario without inconvenience, yet it is far better, and the officials at Washington so view it, for the loan to be scattered among as many of the citizens as possible.

The wholesale subscriptions which came from the everyday citizen, the merchant, the clerk, the railroad man, the laboring man, the professional man do two things, at least. It answers for all time the treasonable and damnable accusation that this is a "rich man's war", a "Wall Street War" and "Wilson War". It should also for the last time shut the mouths of those who declare that the American people are not "in this war".

The over subscription to this loan too, is a second answer to the German lies that

the American people would not back up the administration in its action to prevent the application of German's declared intention to rule the world as she alone chose. Following as it does the registration of 10,000,000 men who can now be equipped and made ready to enter the western war zone the final step has been taken in the preliminary preparation for active participation in the arrest of Germany's ambition to enforce her kultur on the world.

THE RED CROSS FUND.

If a half dozen of the boys from Ontario who have joined the colors and are now training for service in France, were lying suffering from wounds and appeal was made for help Ontario would give liberally.

That is just what is taking place this week, only instead of waiting until the boys are on the fighting line, before their lives are endangered from lack of attention, the Red Cross is appealing for funds so that the boys will be cared for when they need attention. Is not that the proper thing to do?

Those of us who are not for various reasons going to the front now have no right to attempt to escape some sacrifice needed to win this war. It is our war just as much as it is that of the soldiers and the man who does not to his utmost give to the cause of the Red Cross is little less than 100 per cent American.

The attention of The Argus has been called to one citizen who possesses so slight a perspective and is so slightly an American that he publicly declared that he would not buy a Liberty Bonds because the interest rate was too low. To be frank the postal laws do not permit the publication of the proper characterization of such an individual. Such an individual should go where he belongs to Germany, and see what they do with men who won't "buy bonds because the interest rate is too low".

WAR BUDGET SIGNED

Appropriates \$3,340,000,000, the Greatest Sum Ever Voted at One Time.

Washington. — The \$3,340,000,000 war budget, long delayed by congress on technicalities, became law when President Wilson affixed his signature to the measure.

The war budget, known as the urgent deficiency bill, appropriates the greatest sum ever voted in a lump by any legislative body. Its appropriations total a sum far greater than the total cost of any war in which the United States has heretofore engaged. The principal appropriations are for putting the army and navy in fighting trim.

The most important single provision of the measure is the appropriation of \$750,000,000 for the construction of an American merchant marine to carry food and munitions to the entente allies. The delay in making this money available threatened for a time seriously to delay the building of the "food fleet" under the direction of General Goethals and the shipping board.

New Peace Offer Made to Russia, Stockholm, via London.—The Social Demokrat says Germany has made an offer of peace to Russia through a member of the Swiss federal council.
