In Macedonia the artillery duels that have been in progress for several weeks are still going on. The entente forces continue to throw their troops into Thessaly, the occupation of various towns having been accomplished without untoward incident.

Elthu Root, head of the American mission to Russia, in a speech to the council of miniaters in Petrograd, declared that America was fighting for Russian freedom as well as her own and asked Russia to fight equally for American and Russian freedom.

Britain Seeks Her Men in America. New York.-All male British subjects between the ages of 18 and 45 years now in the United States are to be compelled to join the British colors if the laws of this country will permit, it was made known here.

BRUSH FIRES BURN **CALIFORNIA TOWN**

Los Angeles.-The residence section of one town has been wiped out. crops over a wide area have been destroyed, about 1000 persons have been made homeless and several small settiements and resorts were in peril from two brush fires which for 48 hours burned furiously in the Santa Barbara national forest.

The greatest damage has been done in the Olai valley. Only the business section and a few isolated dwellings in the town of Ojal, about 15 miles north of Ventura, Cal., were left standing by the fire. The big Foothill school, recently re-built, was destroyed and many large and expensive country villas, the homes of eastern business and professional men, were burned to the ground.

The second fire, which started Baturday near Carpenteria, Cal., and for a time threatened that town, changed its course and swept toward Stapley park and Shephard's inn, two summer resorts.

"FOOD SUNDAY" JULY 1

Mr. Hoover Calls on Pastors to Preach Conservation Sermons.

New York.--Co-operation with the department of agriculture in impressing upon the people of the country the necessity for the "largest possible production of food and the smallest possible quantity of waste" was urged by Herbert C. Hoover in a letter to 200,000 clergymen of various denominations, distributed through the Pederal Council of the Churches of Christ

All pastors are requested to preach on food conservation Sunday, July 1. and to endeavor to interest religious and civic bodies in a food saving cam-

"In such a time as this," wrote Mr. Hoover, "the people naturally turn to the church. It will be a calamity to the nation and to the churches if their chosen ministers neglect to exercise their proper leadership in the great cause of feeding a world in need, for the world is in want of food."

Mr. Hoover estimated the annual waste of food at \$1,000,000,000.
