The case was argued last fall and and at that time Judge Biggs held that the charter provision declaring that the City would not be responsible for damages of that nature was effective and removed the Corporation from the action. Since that time the Supreme Court, in a Portland case has ruled that such a provision is inoperative, so Attorney W. H. Brooke for Mrs. Caviness sought rehearing.
