ONTARIANS RETURN FROM STATE BAR CONVENTION

Judge and Mrs. Dalton Biggs and Attorney and Mrs. P. J. Gallagher returned last week from the sessions of the Oregon-Washington State bar association at Seattle, where Judge Biggs was one of the program speakers.

Following the convention Mr. and Mrs. Gallagher made the trip thru British Columbia to the Arrowhead Lakes and down the lakes to Spokane. That they were enthusiastic over the trip is a mild statement of the case.

"There is gloom in Canada now," said Mr. Gallagher, in speaking of the impressions received on the journey. "There is hardly a person you meet who has not lost a relative or very dear friend at the front. Mourning is to be seen every where, and one seldom sees a man at the beaches or pleasure resorts. With it all there is evident a feeling of grim determination to see the war thru to a final victory for the allied armies. There is no doubt concerning the loyalty of Canada to the allied cause."

While in Victoria Mr. Gallagher had a unique experience of being present at a Chinese funeral with all its mystic rites and ceremonies.

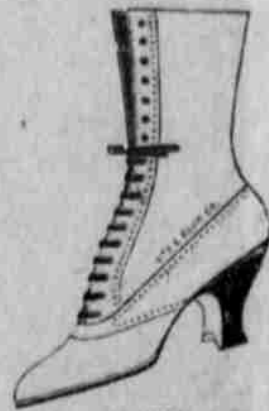
FIRST NATIONAL BANK TAKING ON NEW DRESS.

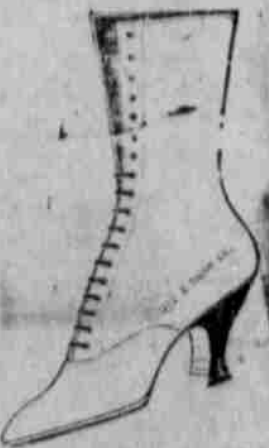

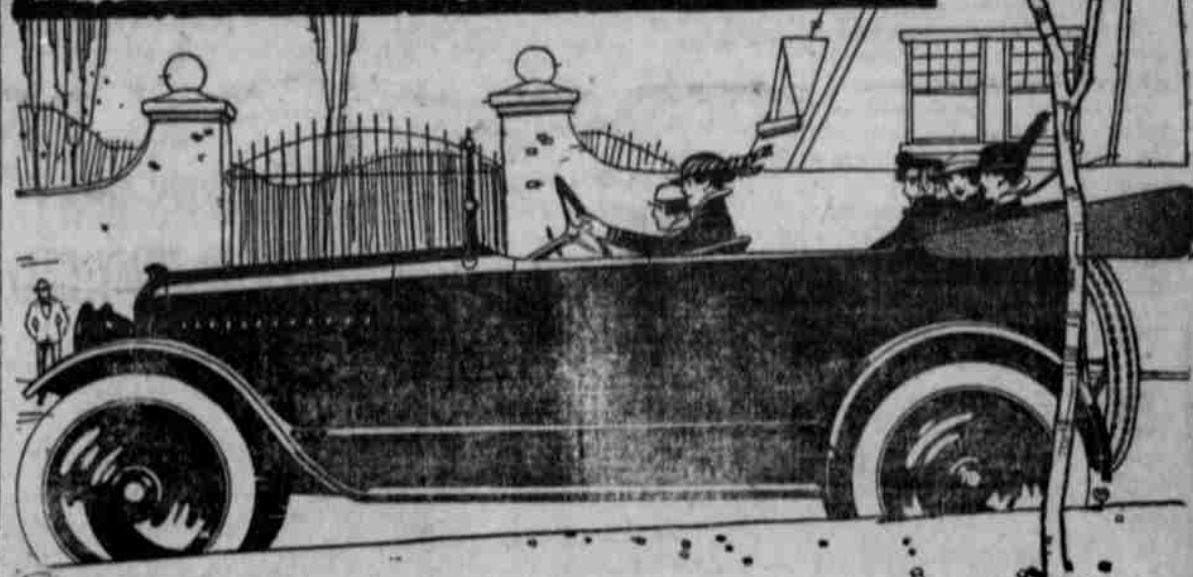
