TEACHERS TO HEAR PRACTICAL PROGRAM

Commercial Club to Play Host for Gathering—"Helping Hoover" will Be one Subject to be Discussed on Opening Day.

Next week will be Teacher's week in Ontario. The city will be the Mecca for the pedagogues of the county who will be here to attend the annual Teacher's Institute. The sessions will begin on Wednesday morning and will continue until Friday afternoon.

The principal figure of the institute will be J. A. Churchill, State Superintendent of Schools, who formerly was superintendent of the Baker City Schools. Among the other lecturers secured by Miss Fay Clark, county superintendent are: Prof. E. D. Ressler; Miss Ida Smith, H. C. Seymour, Dr. E. S. Conklin, and Prof. Brainard.

On the opening day Prof. Ressler will address the teachers on the subject, "Helping Hoover," a discussion of the material needs of the nation at this time.

On Wednesday and Thursday evening's the teachers will be the guests of the Commercial club and the Parent-Teachers association. The latter organization will give a reception Wednesday evening, and on Thursday evening following an auto ride the visitors will be taken to Dreamland where they will witness "The Eyes of the World" a special film secured for the occasion by Manager E. D. Dorman. M. E. Newton is arranging for the auto trip and those who wish to assist in the entertainment of the city's guest should notify him at once. The citizens of Ontario and vicinity are also urged to attend the reception Wednesday evening to meet the teachers at the Moore Hotel parlors.
