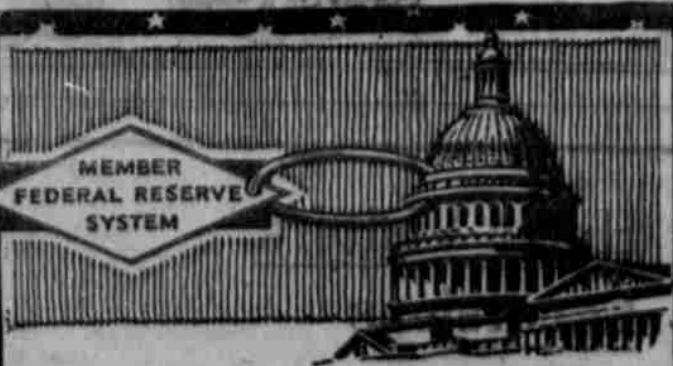

## MORE ONTARIANS TO BE 'DUTCH CLEANSERS'

While Two Are Rejected Others Have Been Accepted—Some of the Boys Now Near Firing Line

Two of the five boys who went from Ontario to enlist last week were not accepted. Harvey Bender failed to pass the examinations at Baker, his eyesight being rated below standard; but he went on to Portland for another try. Willis Hale went to Portland but was sent home because the class to which he aspired had been closed to applicants under 18 years of age, and Willis is only 17. Ray Boyer, the Jewett brothers and Gus Nordstrom seem to have "made the rifle."

Fred Canfield left Friday night for Portland determined to break into the army in some capacity, if only as a "mule skinner." Mrs. Canfield accompanied him as far as La Grande, where she will spend the winter with relatives.

Several of Ontario's boys are now on their way across the Atlantic, some with the Idaho National Guard and others with the regulars. The latest news, received in private telegrams, the news of the sailing of course not being given out for publication, the word received by relatives last week from still other boys already with forces in France and England; and the departure tomorrow of the last eight men to complete the county's quota for the first national army call, all bring home the realization that we are at last in close touch with and a part of the actual military operations in the great war.

## RED CROSS CHAPTER RE-ELECTS ITS OFFICERS

Dr. H. H. Whitney was re-elected chairman of the Ontario chapter of the American Red Cross society at the annual election held in the chapter rooms Monday evening. Treasurer H. B. Cockrum and Secretary Mrs. E. M. Greig were also reelected, preserving the same efficient administration that has been building up the work locally since the chapter was granted. These three officers were elected by acclamation.

The following vice chairmen were elected to complete the roll of officers—Mrs. Irwin Troxell, first; E. A. Fraser, second; H. C. Boyer, third; E. C. Van Petten, fourth. The advisory board will be chosen this week by the chairmen and officers. It will be composed of active local members and representatives of the various auxiliaries.

Notwithstanding the two weeks' notice of the election, the meeting was attended by a discouragingly small number of members. The work of preparing hospital supplies has been keeping up and growing in a gratifying manner, but the officers and advisory board of the chapter have been concerned for some time over the general disinclination of the members to attend meetings.
