ONTARIO'S BOYS AND GIRLS ASKED TO AID SUFFERERS

To the children of Ontario and vicinity the general committee on Community Christmas tree want every boy and girl to have a joyous Christmas. If any of you know of a boy or girl who is liable not to receive a Christmas treat we would be pleased if you would report it to one of the pastors, or a Sunday school Supt., or a school teacher or Supt. Douglas, or one of the editors. We want you all to have a good Christmas but while you are doing so we want you to think of the 400,000 orphan children in the Bible lands who will have no Christmas unless we help send it to them. We are not spending a large sum of money this year for a candy treat, because we feel that you would rather this money be sent to those other children, and we know that you will want to help with the offering, so we are giving you all the chance.

President Wilson says, "Reports indicate that of Orphans alone there are more than 400,000, besides women and other dependent children, reaching a total of more than 2,000,000 destitute survivors. The situation is so distressing as to make a special appeal to the sympathies of all." We are now witnessing in this Twentieth Century, the crucifixion of the three ancient races of Christendom. All because they have repeatedly refused to give up Jesus Christ for Mohammed. These are the people who stretch out their hands to us for sympathy and aid. Today millions of men, women and children are dying for lack of food, clothing and shelter. An old gentleman having charge of an orphanage in Armenia was in Ontario last September and told the writer of one little girl in his home who for seven days had only one crust of bread to eat, and when food did come she was too sick to eat and died. Armenian families supported by American families for 17 cents a day. About \$5 per month. Their Christmas is the Greek Christmas and hence is Jan 19. Our offering will be a Christmas to them.

Christmas stockings are being distributed throughout the community for contributions but if you do not happen to receive one bring your offering to the receiving booth.
