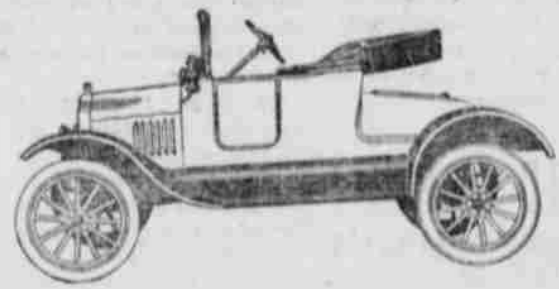
FAULKNER-JOYCE WEDDING
