RYE BREAD FURNISHES

Domestic Science Teacher Tells How To Help Win the War by Using Now Popular Rye Flour.

Rye as a Substitute.

Rye, altho it has been grown extensively in this country, has not en Have More Strength in Their been generally used as a flour for Looks Than We Have in Our Laws, bread making. In the European Men Allude to Them as Weaker Ves- countries rye has been used in bread making for many years and is used almost entirely in place of wheat among the poor of Europe.

In composition it varies only slightly with wheat. The protein content is of a different nature and for this reason it is more sticky than that of wheat.

In making bread from rye flour it is usually combined with other cereals such as barley, cornmel, wheat flour and oatmeal. And bread made from maxtures of the different fluors is very nutritious, and may well take the place of stdaight wheat bread, when wheat is in such demand as it is at the present time.

For bread making, rye used with half wheat flour makes a very light easily made loaf of bread.

Below is a tested recipe of rye bread which has proved very succes-

Rye Bread.

- 1 qt. of liquid.
- 1 cake of compressed yeast. 2 T sugar.
- 2 T fat.
- 2 T salt

Half milk and half water may be used as the liquid. Both should be scalded before using. Dissolv yeast in a portion of the lukewarm liquid. Dissolve fat and sugar in hot lisuid. Rye-Oatmeal Muffins.

- 14 C milk. 1 C cooked catmeal or rolled oats.
- 1 egg.
- 2 T fat 1 1/2 C rye flour.
- 2 T sugar.
- 14 t salt. 4 t B. Powder.
