Dear Sir:

So I transferred to Company M., 62nd Infantry of the regular army, stationed at that time at the Presidio of S. F. Calif., where I stayed until about a month ago, when we came here. every married man who had an income of \$2000 or more is required to report. There are exemptions from tax for children but the report must be made nevertheless.

Mr. Tillson is sent into the county so that anyone who may have any doubts as to whether or not he comes within the provisions of the law can have the advantage of a government official's advice and thus avoid difficulty in the future for violations of the law bring a severe penalty. It is a case of "better be safe than sorry," so a trip to the City Hall week after next or to the Court House at Vale next week is advisable.
