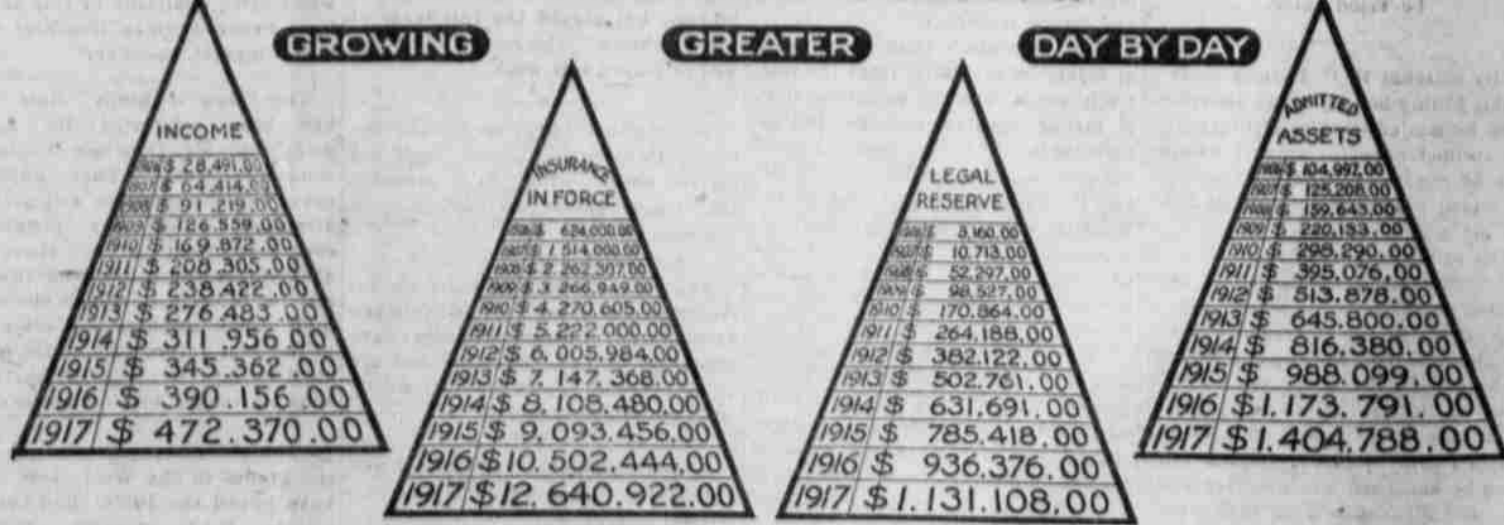
STAR WELL CHOSEN TO DEPICT ROLE OF MOTHER LOVE
