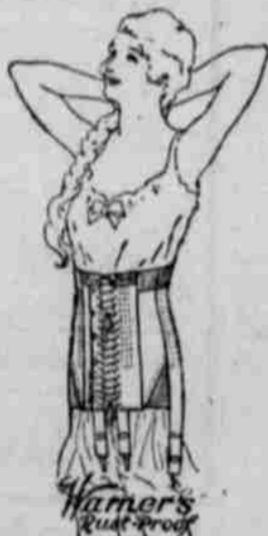

END COMES SUDDENLY FOR MRS. R.V. WELLS

Ardent Worker For Red Cross Called By Death—Family Prominent in This Section.

Mrs. Rachel Moore Wells died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. A. G. Moore, early Sunday morning. The end came suddenly for when she went to bed about 9 o'clock Saturday evening she was apparently in better health than she had been for several days. In fact her daughter believed she was recovering satisfactorily from the slight lung congestion from which she suffered about two weeks previous.

Mrs. Wells who was one of the best knitters in the local Red Cross Chapter had started her 24th pair of socks for some soldier boy on Thursday and Saturday afternoon and evening she worked on them, almost completing them. About one o'clock she called her daughter and in a few minutes the end came.

Funeral services were held on Monday afternoon from the Methodist church conducted by Rev. Earl Hanna assisted by Rev. C. H. Blom. The body was sent to Edmond, Oklahoma to be interred by that of her husband who died some 14 years ago.

Mrs. Wells, whose maiden name was Rachel Virginia Moore, was born in Cole County, Missouri 71 years ago and was married to Elijah H. Wells on Oct. 9, 1866. She is survived by Herbert G. Wells and E. J. Wells, of Boise, Albert D. Wells and Mrs. A. G. Moore, of Ontario; and Mrs. E. Shumacher, of Walter, Oklahoma.

Mrs. Wells came to Ontario in 1911 to make her home with her daughter Mrs. Moore, and save for occasional visits with other members of her family made this city her home. Her sons in Boise are members of the well known contracting firm of Maney Brothers & Wells.
