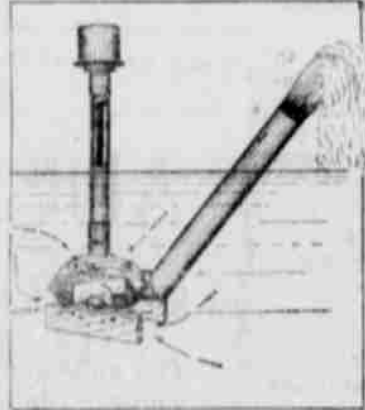

"WIN THE WAR" IS PUBLIC'S ATTITUDE

Eastern Folks Not Demonstrative But Evidently Determined That There Is Only One End In Sight—Victory.

H. C. Boyer of Boyer Bros., returned Sunday from New York and other Eastern cities where he went on a buying trip for the local institution.

"There is not a marked change in business conditions in the East from what they were some six months ago," said Mr. Boyer in speaking of impressions gained across the continent.

"There is a quiet determination evidenced by the business men you meet everywhere. They don't talk about when the war is going to end, as they did some time ago. That setting no time limit, but they are all absolutely certain how it is going to end, and that is by a complete victory for the allies.

"Win the War is the slogan, if there is such a thing, and with that in mind all the time of course that will result. So far as business conditions are concerned they are good or bad as one views them. There is plenty of business, and there is plenty of work for everyone. All of the manufacturers declare they could use more help, but when one goes to buy merchandise it is a different story. Merchandise is harder to get and higher in price for the government has commandeered the output of many plants. However there is merchandise to be had if the buyer is willing to close his eyes and take it at what it is offered."

Mr. Boyer just missed seeing his brother Ray who left for France from an Eastern port before he could reach there.

ONTARIO OVERLOOKING PASSING SOLDIERS

J. W. McCulloch Suggests Fitting Testimony to the Soldier Boys Who Pass By On Their Way "Over There."

Editor Argus: Allow me through the columns of your paper to call attention to the fact that there is a splendid opportunity for the people of this community to show the soldier boys that we have some interest in their welfare. I do not mean to intimate that we have not always shown our interest, but there is one chance to show interest that we have overlooked. Troop trains are passing through every few days with boys going "over there." I have seen four such trains today. Some of these trains stop at the depot and some do not, but whether the train stops or not, the boys are always at the window waving and shouting. The people ought to wave and shout in return. Of course the public is willing and anxious to wave and shout, but the train comes and goes before we know it. Why not make some arrangements down the line, say with Huntington, to get a tip on when a troop train will be along, and then have some system of letting the public know it, so that we can all get out to the depot and give the boys a good send off as they go through? If a train stops, we ought to be provided with apples so that two or three boxes could be put on each coach. The Commercial club, or some other local organization should get busy at once and make arrangements so that we can pay our respects to the boys as they pass through.

It may be that the military authorities would not permit information to be given out of the approach of a troop train. In event we can not be informed of the approach of the trains, why not make arrangements to have at the depot at all times a few boxes of apples to be given to the soldiers every time a train stops.

Let's ginger up a little, and show some spirit every time a train of soldiers passes by. Of course some of the boys will not come back, but this is not their funeral procession. This is their triumphant march in the behalf of liberty and right, and should receive great applause.

Don't be too modest to shout and wave at the boys as they go through on their way "over there."
