M'ADOO SEEKS HELP FOR PUBLIC UTILITIES

Will Ask State and Municipalities to Permit Rate Increases to Meet War Conditions.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Following the receipt of communications from several of the big public utility corporations asking that state and local authorities be urged to consider quickly arguments for readjustment of rates which would tend toward maximum of efficiency, William G. McAdoo, as secretary of the treasury, brought the matter to the attention of President Wilson.

He received a reply from the President expressing the conviction that the public utilities formed a vital part of the war machinery and authorizing him to take up with the proper officials, when circumstances might make such action advisable, the problems involved.

The representatives of the public utilities had brought before Mr. McAdoo what they believed to be the necessity for a general increase in rates if service was to be extended to meet the increased demands of wartime activities. It is possible that some consideration may be given by the Federal Government to the question of extending credit necessary for expansion, especially if the war finance corporation bill is adopted.

The utilities in which the Federal Railroad administration will interest itself are street, railway, light, heat and power companies. Where it appears necessary increases in fares or rates may be suggested.

President Wilson's Reply. Here is the President's reply to Mr. McAdoo's letter: The White House, Washington. My Dear Mr. Secretary: I have examined with care the memoranda and letters which you transmitted to me with your letter of the fifteenth. I fully share the views you express regarding the importance of the public service utilities as a part of our national equipment, especially in war time. It is essential that these utilities should be maintained at their maximum efficiency and that everything reasonably possible should be done with that end in view.

I shall be glad to have you communicate with the local authorities whenever the information in your possession suggests that such a course is desirable and in the national interests.
