

**LEGAL FIGHT MAY BE WAGED OVER CITY'S WATER SYSTEM**

endeavored to secure a price on the plant without avail and that the inventory had only been secured on Tuesday, whereas the city had had its plans and specifications on file with the city clerk for some time and the company was not correct in its statement that no plans could be re-announced as proof of this.

Want \$20,000.

Mr. Wallace declared that the company had an investment of \$20,000, but would sell for \$20,000. This statement was made after it was brought out that Councilman Canfield had once suggested that the city might pay \$4000, naming that figure as a point from which to start negotiations.

Would Rather Give It Away.

Mr. Wallace declared that the company would not consider such a sum: "We would rather give the system to you than take such a sum," he said. "We do not want to stay here and compete with you, but we want a fair price for our plant. We cannot afford to sacrifice it."

The same general arguments were repeated a number of times but always with the same conclusion. As the result Mr. Wallace, who had done most of the talking, tersely remarked: "We are getting nowhere, because we have nothing definite before us." And again he said when reviewing the history of the negotiations: "It appears that there has been too much jockeying and not enough straight talking." To this Councilman C. R. Emison replied: "It seems to us the man from Boise has been doing the jockeying."

Further in the discussion of the statement that the industry which he represented had not made earnings Mayor Homan facetiously remarked: "Is it not true, Mr. Wallace, that the water here has been in the wrong end of the system?" To this Mr. Wallace replied, "No, I mean money actually invested."

**ENGINEERING BUREAU**  
—WAR DEPARTMENT

For several days commencing Monday, March 25, three officers from the War Department will be in Portland to consider applications for commissions in the ordnance officers' reserve corps, and to induct men into the enlisted personnel of the Ordnance department. The board will consider one hundred applicants over draft age for commissions. These men must be college graduates, with an earning capacity of \$1700 per year and must have technical skill acquired either in college or later through business experience and practical shop work. The board will also consider several hundred applicants similarly qualified within draft age. Application blanks may be obtained from J. H.
